


Report Rosy-Finches




If you **work or recreate in the alpine**, the U.S. Forest Service and state fish and wildlife agencies request your observations of rosy-finches. Sightings are uncommon and rosy-finches' breeding range is uncertain in many regions. Familiarize yourself with rosy-finches and report your observations.

The Rosy-Finches

There are three species of rosy-finches in North America. Rosy-finches are 6 inches tall with a wingspan of 13 inches. The species are similar in appearance but all have pink on their wings. Bills may be black or yellow. From June through August, they breed in distinct ranges.

Habitat Use

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During the breeding season, rosy-finches are active in the alpine of high elevation mountains, typically above treeline. They build their nests in rocky, talus slopes or within cliffs. They often forage on seeds and insects gleaned from the ground and around snow fields.

Bird Identification Resources

The Cornell Lab's Merlin App can identify bird songs and calls, including rosy-finches. For use in remote areas without cellular service, we recommend downloading the App's "US: Rocky Mountains" Bird Pack. Recordings can be saved on your smartphone. Sound recordings can be referenced at <u>xeno-canto.org</u> by searching "rosy finch".



Other Alpine Bird Species

There are only a few other bird species that thrive in the alpine. Other species of birds that are not rosy-finches but commonly encountered in the alpine are Clark's Nutcracker, White-crowned Sparrow, American Pipit, Common Raven, and White-throated Swift.
